Rubber Duck Tale

A symbol of bath time fun, rubber ducks have been helping kids get squeaky-clean for more than 100 years.

The first rubber ducks splashed on the scene in the late 1880s, when manufacturers came up with different ways to use Charles Goodyear's newly invented vulcanized rubber. These duckies didn't float, and instead were designed as teething toys for toddlers.

By the 1930s, toy companies were making floating bath toys out of vinyl, although the name rubber duck still stuck. In 1949, sculptor Peter Ganine patented a design for the now-classic bright yellow duck with an orange bill. The cheerful little ducks were marketed as soothing toys for bath time, helping youngsters overcome fears of the water and also learn about hygiene.

In 1970, the TV show "Sesame Street" introduced a new generation of kids to the rubber duck, when the Muppet

character Ernie sang a song about tub time with his squeaky best friend. Released as a single, the ditty "Rubber Duckie" sold over 1 million copies and even cracked the top 20 on the pop music chart.

Inducted into the National Toy Hall of Fame in 2013, rubber ducks are now available in all sizes, colors and designs, including many that resemble entertainment and sports celebrities.

Earth Day Every Day

Earth Day is observed every year on April 22, motivating people to take part in protecting the planet. There are many ways you can help the environment on Earth Day and every day, and they offer additional benefits for you as well.

Need to stop at the supermarket, pharmacy and ATM? Combine these errands in one trip, and plan your route so you don't have to backtrack. *Perks:* If taking your own vehicle, you'll save money on gas and reduce fuel emissions.

Take reusable bags with you when you go shopping, carry a refillable water bottle instead of buying bottled water, and bring your own travel mug to coffee shops and convenience stores. *Perks:* Many businesses offer discounts to customers who bring their own bags and drink containers. Saving a few cents on every purchase can add up quickly!

Leaving the water running for just a minute can send 3 gallons of water down the drain, so turn the faucet off while brushing your teeth or shaving. Try to trim a few minutes off your shower time. *Perks:* In addition to saving hot water for the rest of the people in your household, you will be contributing to water conservation in your community.

When you can, reduce your carbon footprint by walking or cycling to your destination. *Perks:* You'll get exercise and fresh air, which benefits both your physical and mental health.

Right as Rain

Don't let April showers dampen your enthusiasm to learn all about rain!

- Each minute, 1 billion tons of rain falls on the Earth.
- Nimbostratus and cumulonimbus are the two most common types of rain clouds. The nimbostratus is a flat, gray cloud that hangs low in the sky. The cumulonimbus is a tall, puffy cloud that looks flat at the top and has a dark gray base.
- Falling at an average speed of 14 mph and from an average cloud height of 2,500 feet, a raindrop takes about two minutes to hit the ground.
- Grass looks greener after a shower because rain contains nitrogen, which is a natural fertilizer.
- Scientists say rain is not actually shaped like a teardrop. Raindrops start out in a spherical shape, and as they fall, they encounter air pressure that flattens the bottom of the drops, so they actually look like the top half of a hamburger bun.
- Petrichor is the word that describes the scent of rain. When raindrops fall on clay or dusty soils, they trap small air bubbles on the surface, which then rise and burst out of the droplets, producing the fresh, familiar fragrance.
- Scientists have studied fossilized raindrop imprints in 2.7 billion-year-old rock formed from volcanic ash.
- In hot, dry regions, rain sometimes evaporates before it hits the ground. The scientific term for this is virga, but it is also commonly called "phantom rain."
